CURRENT BOOK PROJECT

Broughton, Chad. 2020. *Slow Down, Little John: Crime, Justice, and Family in the American City*. Proposal currently under review. Rooted in a decade of fieldwork, *Slow Down, Little John* centers on one man's two-year reentry experience after prison, wrapping his life story, and those of several others, in the sociological contexts of the family, the neighborhood, and the criminal justice system, and asks how formerly violent offenders make their way post-incarceration in a world full of risks and obstacles, and what it means for the debate about ending mass incarceration.

Collaborator with Andrew Papachristos, The Northwestern Neighborhood & Network Initiative. Researcher on the Evaluation of Police-Community Engagement Efforts in Chicago. N3 is a research partner and external evaluator of The Policing Project's efforts to foster trust between citizens and police in Chicago: the Community Engagement Initiative (CEI) and the Neighborhood Policing Initiative (NPI). The evaluation documents the development of CEI and NPI and analyzes how the two programs affect satisfaction with the police, perceptions of public safety, and community-police engagement.
